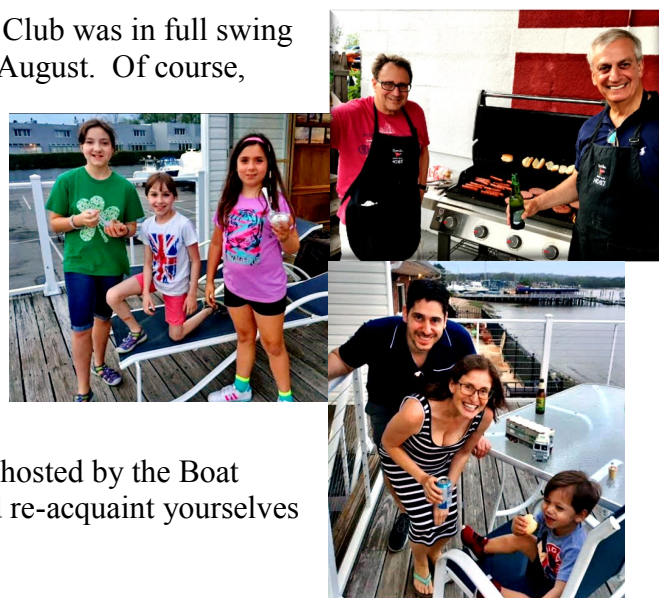
FIRST FRIDAY HAPPY HOUR AT NSYC

Junior Sailing Program -2018 at NSYC

The second season of the junior sailing program got off to a wonderful start. We hired a new top notch instructor, Alex, to teach the children. Alex is a level one instructor with a lifetime of sailing and racing experience. Ok, he is only 19, but he is very capable, clearly growing up on a boat. The first two sessions were fully booked with 4 children, each in their own Optimist.

Session one had children ranging from 6 years to 12 years. Two of the girls, Sheridan and Katherine, were returning sailors from last season. After passing the swim tests and capsizing drill, everyone was on their way to learning to sail. On the second day they were all sailing, and our 6 year old boy found himself navigating around a sea plane. We even celebrated Alex's birthday during this session.

Session two also had four children ranging in age from 9 years to 15 years. There were two boys and two girls and the children really got along well together. This group was highly challenged by the weather, first having no wind and then too much wind and rain.

All the children seemed to enjoy themselves. No wind days were sometimes spent being towed around or on the beach. The kids never missed a chance to jump in the water to cool off. The stormy days were filled with "chalk talk", sailing videos, and board games, and challenging games of Twister.

At the time of this writing there were 2 spots booked for each of the remaining sessions but we anticipate filling up some of those spots with daily registrations.

All in all, it has been another successful season, and I truly hope someone in the club will volunteer to take over this program so it can continue on next year. Not only is it profitable but it attracts younger members to join the club with their children. If you have the time, please consider volunteering.

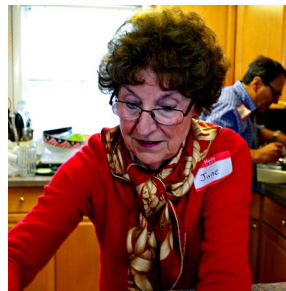
148th NSYC Commissioning

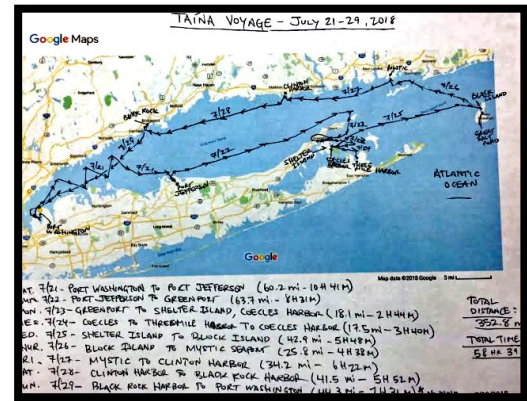
The next morning we motored into a strong northerly to Stonington for one night before jumping off for Newport.

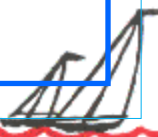

We share our achievements and failures in a spirit of comradery with our fellow sailors and friendly competitors.

At NSYC we strive to provide the opportunity of sailing excitement for **all** of our members through a variety of club races of various formats: a YRA sanctioned distance race; a moonlit night race; a cruising race; and afternoon races for single hand, double hand, and full crew.
