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From the Commodore

It's hard to believe that this will be my final letter to you. So you will excuse me if this one is a bit longer than my usual efforts, there is much to say. These last two years have presented both triumphs and challenges. We welcomed new members and sadly had to say goodbye to some very dear friends. Our Bylaws were revised and approved, and our club is stronger than ever. We have seen establishment of a successful and proactive Club Marketing Program and attention to some much needed infrastructure repair and improvement. Additionally, the social activities have been well attended. Through it all, it has been my honor and pleasure to serve as your Commodore. The amount of encouragement, advice and support I received through my term was incredible and very much welcomed and appreciated. I also had an outstanding team of dedicated Officers, Trustees, Committee Chairs, Committee Members and Volunteers that made my job easier. My sincere thanks to all of them!

In the last two years, our club faced two major and unprecedented hurricanes (Irene and Sandy) and two early Nor'easters. During the recent Hurricane, some of our fleet suffered damages with a total loss of one of our boats. We did sustain some damages to our decks, docks and basement and through the heroic efforts of our Club Steward Captain Vic and several brave members who during the height of Sandy, saved our dinghy dock and the boats tied to it from certain destruction and with limited damage. We are now taking stock of what will need to be repaired and what our insurance will cover.

It must be said that the combination of these storms have hit us with a one-two punch to our bottom line...more about this below. I am glad to say that the damage to our bulkhead was not as severe as our contingency plan expected. The cracks in the seawall did extend completely through the wall and would have gotten worse if not attended to and there was some erosion of the ground behind but not as extensive as feared. This resulted in a reduction in the cost of the project. Our new seawall should take us well into the next century! Many thanks are owed to Trustee Richard Raskin for expertly shepherding us through this very complicated project. Some of the savings will be put toward replacing the lower deck, which had to be removed for the project but was also previously damaged by Irene.

Now about that bottom line. Our operating expenses have increased due both to the required storm damage repairs and increases in costs of fuel, insurance etc. The Budget for 2013 includes a moderate dues increase. Your Bridge has the fiduciary responsibility to make sure our Club operates on a sound financial footing while at the same time balancing the impact these increases can have on our membership. We attempted to approach this increase in a balanced increment this year but as always, we will need to closely watch our expenditures going forward. Our investments as reported at the Fall Membership meeting are still sound and our Club is on solid financial footing. You will be receiving an updated dues and fees schedule sometime in December.

As always, one solution to the budget pressure are new memberships and you should know that our Membership and Marketing Committees are working overtime to attract new folks, but you can also play a part as word-of-mouth is still the best way to get prospects interested. Part of the North Shore experience is our volunteerism; it is a good way for us to reduce our operating expenses and to get to know our fellow members. Please consider putting some of your skills to work for the betterment of the Club and answer the "call". There is work that needs to be done prepping the Club for the winter season. In addition, there are always the "Spring" work parties to get ready for Commissioning as well as Committee Work. Also, our 'House" could use some TLC as well. I hope to see you during some of these events.

Finally, the task of successfully operating and keeping our club off the "rocks" is not an easy one. Your new Commodore, Paul Meilink, and new Bridge, are ready, willing and very able to take on the challenges facing us in the coming years, and I ask that you join with me in our support for them in their efforts.

Rosemary and I wish you peace and happiness in the coming Holiday Season and we will see you at the Club!

In the last two years, our club faced two major and unprecedented hurricanes (Irene and Sandy...aka, the "Super Storm") and two early Nor'easters. We survived them all.

As Sandy battered the area, the impact and damage increased on Monday, October 29 and throughout that night. Some of our fleet suffered damages with a total loss of one of our boats. We did sustain some damages to our decks, docks and basement. The storm destroyed the lower staircase, which is now under reconstruction by the membership under the direction of the new Fleet Captain, Bill Fish. The dinghy docks suffered some damage. The storm trashed the basement, resulting in a classic post-storm mess filled with old and new very-jumbled-tumbled rubble.

Before and throughout Sandy's onslaught, the heroic efforts of our Club Steward, Captain Vic, assisted by a variety of brave efforts from the Club's friend, Ken Kraft, and later by NSYC members Gary Cohen and Paul Meilink, prepared for the super storm, stayed on top of its evolving impact and took immediate remedial actions with our fleet. These actions not only reduced the storm's impact on our fleet but also saved our dinghy dock and the boats tied to it from certain destruction resulting in limited damage.

Despite Sandy's challenge, again the spirit of North Shore Yacht Club's volunteerism stepped to the plate. On Saturday, November 10, a large member "Super Work Party" completely emptied and rearranged the contents of the basement and filled a large construction dumpster with rubble and trash, which was later removed.

Looking back, we can surely expect tales of Sandy to abound. She took a big swing at NSYC but the NSYC spirit of response helped to avoid the devastation so frequently seen throughout the area. Looking forward, we can be proud of our club spirit and the fresh look emerging with our bulkhead, seawall, lower deck, staircase and basement.









NSYC's Community Service Team – Another Model Boat Regatta Hit!

It was 10:15AM, **June 3rd**, a brilliant Sunday at Port Washington's Baxter Pond. A breeze, initially from the west at 8 knots, stimulated 201 third grade Harborfest "skippers" to whoop it up as they anxiously awaited their turn to race their own one-design, pontoon-style sailboats built from milk and juice cartons and basic sailboat accoutrements.....all in the spirit of re-cycling and promoting Port Washington's nautical heritage. Accompanying them were friends, families, pets and just about anyone else....a crowd estimated at well over 400. Within 90 minutes, 20 elimination heats, each with 25 model boats, were run resulting in crowning 6 school champs and the "All Port Champs" for 2012. The School Spirit Trophy was also awarded to the school with the highest rate of participation which was well over 50%.

At the core of this annual, ever-improving event, from beginning to very successful end, were 13 members from North Shore Yacht Club's "Community Service Team" supported by 30 other volunteers along the way.

The "beginning" of this very successful event commenced in 2012's winter as cruisers dream of new and old destinations and boat racers dream of improved sail trim, crew coordination and racing rules. As the ground hog was looking for his shadow, members of NSYC were wide awake and well underway. Mary Lu Dempsey and Bill Palafox, working with neighbor Bill Brakman (MBYC) in his workshop, were busy preparing over 400 model boat kits for use by the third graders to build their own boats later in the spring. Next, came the training of more volunteers as classroom trainers by Arlene Kase and Marian Weissman of NSYC. These freshly-trained classroom trainers, plus Arlene, Mary Lu, Marian, Nancy Kovachs and Bill Palafox of NSYC, ultimately trained over 400 thirds graders in model boat building. Much more than an arts-and-crafts event, an observer could hear trainers emphasizing "bow, stern, port, starboard, main, boom, pontoon, hull, centerboard, sheet, cleat, etc." to the fledgling third-grade skippers. Next up... race day in early June.

As early Junes can go, the weather on race day started, "too perfect" from a sailboat racer's perspective...questionable wind to propel the model boats. The first few elimination heats were propelled totally by Mother Nature. As the breeze dropped, large portable fans supplied by the Atlantic Hook and Ladder Company, assured a breeze for racing. The crack volunteer team, led by the NSYC Community Service Team with other individual volunteers, Scout Troop 423 and the Ancient Order of Hibernians, kept the action moving forward briskly, under control, with much fun, all clearly validated by cheers and happy faces from the third-grader participants.

- Ken "Captain Kayak" Magida, "Lloyd "Captain Canoe" Herman and Marian Girardin led the on-water team to assure accurate finish line scoring, model boat recoveries and returns to their owners.
- Andy Weissman, with large American Flag in full display on the official starter's platform over the pond, executed perfect and timely starting horn countdowns.
- Butch "CPA" Rufino and Rosemary Furno assured that perfect race results were captured for ultimate prizes.

- Mary Lu and the volunteer scout troop facilitated rapid shoreline recovery of boats completing each of the 20 heats.
- Marian Weissman carefully ushered individual heat winners, despite pressures from the crowd, to the "Winners Circle" in prep for subsequent and accurate run-off heats.














Hauling Out

At 7:59 am we rounded the dock heading for the hauling slip at Marina del Rey, anxious to be ontime for our lift. Since there were 3 cranes, we radioed for clarification. "The haul-out facility opens at 8 am" was the curt reply. Gotta love it, 'Island Time', Mon!

When the workers arrived around 8:15 and gestured for us to back into the middle slip, we were ready: I'd made several circles waiting for them and was comfortable with the wind and currents. Everyone had gotten the lines and fenders prepared, and the docking was uneventful. Once tied to the dock, we observed as the men secured straps under the hull at the 'sling points' designated on Sinan's rail.

We were all eager to see the growth on the underside of our boat. It had been three months since we'd had her cleaned and that whole time we'd been stationary at the Palmas Marina. On the 15-mile trip up the coast from Humacao the engine had overheated due to barnacle growth on the intake hose. Then when we could get the engine running, we could only make 2.4 knots. This was in relatively flat seas, so we knew it'd be ugly down there.

The engine on the lift started with a deep rumble that continued into a higher pitched roar. It's grating noise drove us back from the machine, as we watched the lifting straps tighten against Sinan's hull. Like a mother lifting an infant out of the crib, our boat was raised up out of the water into an embrace and carried ashore. That was when we saw what we'd been so eager to see -- a colorful bevy of ocean life.



Three Months of Growth

Not as bad as the dreadlocks of seaweed I'd imagined clinging to our hull, but still awe-inspiring in a nauseating way, there were growths of every imaginable size and texture. With the boat stabilized above the ground, I was drawn in to examine the heretofore hidden treasure. As my fingers stretched to probe, to quench that desire to 'see' with my hands, a large calloused hand encircled my wrist pulling it back.

Angel, who really lived up to his namesake warned me not to touch it. In broken English he conveyed the perils of getting too close. It was not a moment too soon because it was then that I saw the surface come to life. Squirmy maggot-like worms and tiny crabs came run-

ning to the surface of the lesions. Rats jumping off a sinking ship, I thought as these parasites abandoned their rapidly drying homes. When we launched again, and headed out for the anchorage off Los Palaminos we were motoring above 6.5 knots through the water without pushing the engine past 2,000 rpms. The next day, we sailed at over 8 knots, close-hauled, rail-in-the-water, in only 16 knots of true wind. We sure hope all this lasts and that we'll soon have another opportunity to sail some serious distances with such an impressive performance. Next stop...Cartegena???



Looking Back

It's a Mystery...

North Shore YC members have much to be proud of when it comes to their Club. We were the first club founded for the average sailor. Evidence suggests that we held the first one-design regatta on the Eastern Seaboard. And we have risen, phoenix-like, from recessions, depressions, fires and storms. But perhaps the claim to fame we know best is that we are the oldest yacht club on Long Island Sound..

Although the Sewanakha Yacht Club in Oyster Bay was also founded in 1871 it has graciously recognized our claim, and at a recent multi-club affair graciously gave our Commodore pride of place.

With this claim in mind, I decided to search through the Club's surviving records and papers to try to find the minutes of the original meeting, the one I assumed had to have occurred in 1871. I found those minutes in a Minute Book, an old leather-bound yearbook suitable for minutes of meetings or other records commercial or personal. Embossed on the front cover was the date—1872.

I was stunned. 1872! How could that be? Had the Club for over a century iterated an original error so often that the error had become truth by repetition?

The entry itself seemed to confirm little. It mentions the location of the meeting—122 William St. in Lower Manhattan—but the date is noted as "Saturday, February ____, 1872." The omission of the specific date raised questions. Was the secretary careless? Forgetful? A more serious question arose after closer examination of the entry showed a correction added under "1872." It read "1871" and "see later dates." It was signed "Vaux." C. Bower Vaux was Secretary and Treasurer of the Club in 1881. This "correction," added a decade after the presumed date of the Club's founding, turned the matter into a mystery.

To find some answers I began searching through other surviving records and papers. I found some confirmation of M. Roosevelt Schuyler as first commodore in 1871 as mentioned in the original minutes. Also, the minutes note the acceptance of a constitution and bylaws prepared by our founder W.L. Alden. The Constitution and bylaws are lengthy and indicate a period of preparation that can be reasonably assumed to have pre-dated the February, 1872 date. Common sense also suggested the 1871 date as valid. Many of the original 1871 and 1872 members were still in the Club, and we can reasonably assume they or the succeeding Secretary, W.P. Stevens, who joined the Club in 1880, would have noticed the correction and objected if it were inaccurate. Finally, Vaux would have no shady reason for changing the date. Ours is the "oldest club on Long Island." But at the time of our founding we were located in the City and would not locate to the Sound for many years. Thus, adding a year to our age would have been at that time historically meaningless.

I still hoped for more evidence or at least clarification. Then serendipity struck. Reading through a mess of unorganized papers I stumbled upon a carbon copy—unsigned, as was the practice—of a letter written on September 14, 1944 by an apparently older former member to a then active member. The writer notes that he, too, "had puzzled over the conflicting dates" in the letter. He explains that the minutes of the first meetings were not formally recorded until a "suitable minute book had been secured" for recording them. So, "for want of a minute book..." He adds that the first meeting should be noted "as of 1871." His credibility is enhanced by his closeness to the Founding Fathers. He speaks of "Alden and Schuyler when I knew them so well." This unidentified member speaks almost as an eye-witness to our history.

Of course questions remain. However, I believe it is safe to say that based on the surviving evidence, North Shore Yacht Club can continue to state proudly and confidently that ours is "the oldest club on the Sound."

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<u>Treasurer's Report - November 14, 2012</u>

As you are aware, we have demolished the lower deck and dinghy racks and the sea wall repair is essentially complete. Richard Raskin is proceeding with the plans to reconstruct the lower deck. In addition, the storm destroyed the lower staircase, which will probably be reconstructed by the membership under the direction of the new Fleet Captain, Bill Fish, and the dinghy docks suffered some damage which will require an unknown expenditure to repair but which will not likely be significant enough to be covered by insurance. In addition, the storm trashed the basement. A large group of members completely emptied and re-arranged the contents of the basement after filling a large dumpster with the trash, which was removed. All of these projects have placed a strain on the club finances.

Notwithstanding these expenditures, our financial condition is sound. We no longer have the significant cash reserves, which we enjoyed the past 2 years, but still, have sufficient cash to fund current operations and we do not have any debt. The difference is that we cannot fund all the foregoing repairs out of current revenues without severely depleting our cash.

The Bridge, in adopting the budget for the coming year, is attempting to continue operations without incurring debt but recognizing that our cash position is not what it has been in the recent past. The Bridge, therefore, reluctantly, adopted several modest increases to the Dues and Fees schedule. You will be receiving the new schedule with the bills to be mailed on or about December 1. Without going into full detail at this time, I merely want to alert you to the fact that there are some changes and briefly outline the key changes:

Dues increases are as follows:

Active - from \$2,350 to \$2,475 Affiliate - from \$1,800 to \$1,875 Associate - from \$390 to \$425 Secondary - from \$1,175 to \$1,200

In addition, the Bridge has determined that fewer members seem to be fulfilling their work requirement. In an effort to incentivize members to fulfill their work requirement, the Bridge has established that effective December 1, 2012, Actives and Affiliates who do not fulfill their 8-hour work obligation will be required to pay \$400 in lieu of work (an increase of \$50).

As I announced at the Membership meeting in October, some of our members enjoy visiting other yacht clubs and using their facilities. Processing the payments for members' individual charges places a burden on our staff and adds to the expense of our operations. We therefore request that all members settle their accounts at other clubs with credit cards, checks or cash, whenever possible. Although we have had a policy of charging members a \$5.00 per transaction fee for some time, it has never been enforced. The Bridge has now determined that we can no longer absorb this expense. Consequently, effective December 1, this fee will be added to each transaction at another club, when it is invoiced to the member.

Lastly, the Bridge intends to carefully monitor all expenditures in an effort to get us through this difficult year without diminishing our financial strength.
