

AED for Club

We have installed an automatic emergency defibrillator (AED) which is located on the wall by the front door. In the event of a cardiac emergency, the unit is ready and available for use. Capt. Vic and all launch operators will be trained in its use, as are many of our members.

The unit is portable so it can be used anywhere - not just in the Clubhouse. Please note that there is a green indicator light on the front of the unit which flashes approximately every 10 seconds and which indicates that the unit is functioning properly.

(Please do not touch the unit except in an emergency when it is needed. Do not turn it on or off or remove the battery/pad pack as that only reduces battery life. Also, the pad pack is 'single use' and if it is opened, it will need to be replaced.)







<u>Vice-Commodore's Report – June 2015</u>

I am pleased to report that the AED has been installed in the downstairs hallway in an alarmed cabinet. I hope that we never need to use it but, like safety items on our boats, its presence gives us all peace of mind. I encourage all members to take a CPR/AED course to become familiar with this significant life-saving technique. Courses are available through the Red Cross, local hospitals, etc. If there is sufficient interest, I will attempt to arrange for a class to be given at the Club.

The new sign has been installed on the dock and it provides clear notice to all entering by boat who we are. I am attaching a photo.

The Legacy Committee held its organization meeting recently and is working towards implementing a program to encourage members to show their love and appreciation for the Club by way of financial donations. I am certain that you will be hearing more from me on this subject in the future.

The Strategic Planning Committee is looking for assistance from anyone with experience or an interest in human relations. We would like to formalize our employment policies. Please contact me if you have such experience.

Dingle, Dangle, ... Dongle?


NSYC-USE OF CHROMECAST DOGLE

We are glad to announce that the Club has installed a Chromecast "dongle." The dingle, I mean dongle, is a 'thingy' for people who want to cast (broadcast) from computer/phone to the TV. It sort of dangles from one of those input holes on the back of the TV. But, only items which can be viewed in a Google Chrome browser can be viewed on the TV. You cannot cast a Word document, or a movie stored on your computer, unless you can view such with Google Chrome. *Got that?*

To use the Chromecast Dongle:

- Turn on TV and cable box using Cablevision remote control
- 2. Connect computer to NSYC Wi-Fi.
- 3. Using Chrome browser, open Chromecast. (If needed, download from: Google.com/Chromecast/setup)
- 4. Cast to NSYC. (TV should automatically switch from cable to your Google Chrome screen.)
- 5. When done casting to the TV, please do the right thing and reset everything to TV. To return to TV:
- 1. Exit out of Chromecast.
- 2. If TV does not automatically switch back to cable station:
 - a. Make sure cable box is still turned on.
 - b. Use Sony TV remote (often found near the stereo- please return to there) to change program source to TV:
 - i. by pressing the INPUT at top left.
 - ii. Then press up/down arrows to desired position and then press center button to select source shown on TV.





Racing on Long Island Sound

February 5, 2015

Zach Runci, has been sailing and racing since he was five years old and is now in his third year as head coach of SUNY Maritime's Sailing Team. After giving us his thoughts on some fine points of racing such as starts, mark roundings and spinnaker sets, he then went into more detail on several other critical racing situations, especially boat clearance at various points in a race. He then gave us great picture of what sailing on the college team level can be, the SUNY Maritime program and the rigors experienced by the students.

In closing, he shared his perspective as team coach and talked about overall strategy for winning races over a given season. The audience discussion was spirited and Coach Runci was terrific with his clear and concise explanation of racing rules.











Long Island Sound Environment

March 1, 2015

The Education Committee invited the Long Island Sound Study (LISS) to give a presentation on their work combating the pollution of Long Island Sound. Amy Mandelbaum, the Outreach Coordinator briefly explained the organization, but she quickly turned the presentation over to our own NSYC member, Joel Ziev LISS Member of the Citizen Advisory Committee.

Joel explained how the major watersheds flow into the Long Island Sound and impact the conditions of the water. 24 million people live within 50 miles of the Sound and we need to clean up and protect these waters. In 1994 LISS completed a Comprehensive Conservation and Management Plan that identified 7 issues:

low dissolved oxygen (hypoxia)
Toxic contamination
Pathogen contamination
Floatable debris
Living resources and habitat management
Land use and development
Public involvement and education

After explaining the issues and what is being done, Joel explained how it is important to work on small manageable issues and not be overwhelmed by the magnitude of the problem. He described his success in cleaning up Sheets Creek with local help. He found 5 cranes buried among the rest of the debris and was able to remove them all.

Sail Design & Shape

Tuesday March 24, 2015

Mark Washeim, one of our favorite presenters sponsored by the NSYC Education Committee, returned to NSYC on March 24th to share his thoughts on sail design and sail shape. As an expert sail maker and sail user, he presented fascinating approaches to getting boats to sail fast ranging from the sails themselves, the equipment involved, sailing techniques and what we might expect to see in the future.

Of special interest, was Mark's discussion regarding the evolving sail "foils" and their use and how they may influence the future of sailing.

The audience left with a better feel for sail design and shape and a lingering provocative question, "What will sails look like and be made of in the future and what boats will use them?"









Sail Trim Seminar

Dave Coughlin of UK Sailmakers, an energetic and knowledgeable speaker, discussed the details of sail aerodynamics, effects of sail trim under various conditions, and surprisingly and informatively, the contribution of the hydrodynamics forces of foils (keel) on boat performance. If Bernoulli's principles of fluid flow and vector analysis is your thing—this was the seminar for you!

2015 NSYC BLUE WATER CRUISE

Last fall, Alan Bernstein and I hatched a plan to sail off-shore and thought a trip to Chesapeake Bay would be fun. We soon realized that the distance was too great and scaled down our expectations to Cape May, NJ – a reasonable expectation for 7 to 10 days. Our efforts to enlist others to join us were not successful and on Monday evening, May 25, we packed Cool Fire and settled in for a good night sleep on the mooring.

Tuesday morning we left the mooring at 0730 hrs. and headed out of the Bay and into the East River. By 1000 hrs., we were waving goodbye to Fran who was on her balcony on York Avenue. All was going beautifully according to plan until we exited Lower New York Bay and found ourselves fighting a 20 knot southerly. We passed Sandy Hook and had a great sail in the ocean but were getting no closer to our immediate goal of Manasquan Inlet which was to be our first stop. We adjusted our plan and headed for my friends' mooring at Keyport YC which provided a great sail on the beam. We explored Keyport, met my friends for dinner and had a great stay.

Wednesday was a grey day and we did not motivate quickly. The wind continued out of the south and we gave up hope of getting further south. We finally left the mooring after lunch, intending to return, but the sailing was good and we adjusted our plan to go to Atlantic Highlands YC just a few miles to the east. AHYC is located in a municipal marina behind a sea wall which took a beating in Sandy so everything is brand new and first class. Wednesday night is their race night so the place was hopping and they served a great buffet dinner. We met several people who come to visit us each year and made new friends, as well.

Thursday, there was a threat of rain and it was another grey day but with less wind. We decided to take Alan's fast dink and explore the Navasink River. Red Bank is about 10 miles up the river and it was a nice ride. We enjoyed lunch and a walk to explore the town which is very nice – many interesting restaurants and shops. We had plenty of food on board so Alan cooked up a great dinner and then we went ashore for a nightcap.

Friday morning we went ashore for breakfast and explored the town. It is very accessible from AHYC and there are many shops and restaurants. We then headed to Sheepshead Bay in Brooklyn. I would add a Captain's Note,"

As Ken indicates, this turned out to be more of an exploratory trip than originally planned. However, for me, it opened up a great new place to go when the tides are right. Raritan Bay is a really nice place to sail in and it has a few places to explore that offer a different atmosphere than the usual New England type towns than we most often cruise to. The Bay is big has plenty of water in most places, we had very little traffic and the wind was strong off the ocean. I would highly recommended this as a cruising destination and it is possible to do as a long day sail or an overnight.

We did, however, learn a few things and one of them was that ship traffic in the NY Harbor and the East River can be formidable and a review of traffic safety rules is in order for anyone going south. The other thing was that we were open to adjusting our itinerary to the conditions. While we started out thinking Cape May, the weather reports for that destination would have meant sailing when conditions during the tail end of the trip would have been consistently bad. Adjusting our plan made sense and saved us three days of foul weather experience. An experience neither of us need for our resumes at this time.

We are trying to put together a cruising roundtable for the summer and will make a plan with PC Gold to do it ASAP

Cruising Corner 2015

Free chart plotting software installed on a laptop or iPad for your boat....

Formerly I used a 3 ½ inch chart plotter for navigation. *NOW, I can use my laptop with free chart plotter software!* I have all the functionality – speed, heading, tracking, routes, waypoints – all the functions of my little plotter — but on my large laptop, or on a tablet.\
The software is *Opencpn* which may be installed free on your laptop or iPad. Charts are free – a single download from NOAA got me the entire Northeast Coast chart collection with all the various scale charts for our region (choose Coast Guard District 1 for our area or just get New York State if you are worried about having sufficient disk space). You control which scale chart is displayed.



The charts are either vector (ENC), so they don't break -up as you zoom in, or raster (RNC), so they look just like the printed charts you are (hopefully) used to using. You can use both type, as you wish.

If your computer doesn't have a GPS receiver you can get one for around \$30 with a USB connection. Links for downloads and GPS receiver/antenna:



For the GPS receiver/antenna - go to Amazon and get the GlobalSat BU-353-S4 USB GPS Receiver by GlobalSat. Buy a USB extension cable and get free shipping.

If you have an AIS receiver, this can be overlaid onto the laptop chart plotter display. Current and tide info can also be added.

- Log in to ActiveCaptain.com and set up an account with your email and password.
- 2. Download ActiveCaptain Companion on your phone or tablet from the Apple or Android app store. You can also do this on your computer but I assume that most people will not always have the computer on the boat or powered up. Then log in with your Active Captain account.
- 3. You cannot go any further unless you have an eCard for your boat. You get this from eboatcard.com. When setting up the eboatcard, you can insert as much or as little information about yourself and your boat as you wish.
- 4. When you get this accomplished, send me an email and I will circulate the information of who has joined from the Club to everyone who tells me they have joined. Then let's play with it and see if it has any value.

So, after the first race last year I was shocked at how much they did not know and what they could not do. I thought: "What did I get myself into?" I thought about making up some excuse to abort the season but they also realized that they were coming up short. Each of them suggested we practice and I teach.

We practiced a couple of times a week, Rosemary came from Brooklyn and Arlene had her own boat and was a very busy lady but she made the time. Instead of me pre-rigging the boat they rigged the boat. We sailed, trimmed, tacked, gibed, put the whisker pole up and took it down.

We gibed the pole, adjusted the halyards, the leads, sail shape; we rounded marks this way and that way. We talked about the racing rules, strategy, approaching marks, currents, winds and tides. And then we did it all over again and again and again.

After a while Rosemary was good enough and confident enough to relieve me on the tiller when necessary; Arlene learned to steer with a tiller for the first time – she is still uneasy about that one. They learned how to anticipate and communicate, how to feed me information and to question what I was doing or about to do so that I had to rethink my strategy.

They learned how to release the genny when tacking; how to position their bodies and use their body parts to initially trim the genny and then to winch her home; and where to sit in the boat under different conditions and points of sail. They went to the gym and worked out.

Each week they got a little better. Each week we practiced some more and each week they grew more confident. Every now the then we finished in the money. We even won some trophies.

These ladies have come a long way baby through their own efforts and determination. I am very proud of them. They are proud of themselves and they have earned the recognition that comes with this award.

FLAG ETIQUETTE

The United States Power Squadrons (USPS) Flag Etiquette Committee published an Updated Flag Code in 1998 intended to eliminate confusion and help recreational boaters to show proper respect for each flag and pennant flown. The complete publication can be found at http://www.usps.org/f_stuff/etiguett.html.

A brief summary of the relevant provisions follows:

United States Ensign

The U.S. national ensign, sometimes called "50-star" or "Old Glory", is the proper and preferred flag for all U.S. vessels. Your boat should wear it from 0800 until sunset, and when you enter or leave port during daylight or at night, weather and rig permitting. While in port, if you leave your boat and will not return before sunset, lower and stow the national ensign before you go.

Marconi-rigged sailboats may fly the ensign from the leech of the aftermost sail or from the back stay, approximately 2/3 the distance up its length.

At anchor or made fast, the ensign should be flown from the stem staff of all boats. The U.S. national ensign has a 10:19 (approximately 1:2) hoist/fly ratio.

Unites States Yacht Ensign

The U.S. yacht ensign features a blue canton (the rectangle at the upper comer nearest the staff) having 13 white stars and a fouled anchor. Traditionally, the yacht ensign had a 10:19 hoist/fly ration like the U.S. ensign. Today it is found with a 2:3 or 3:5 ratio. However, the preferred flag is the 50-star national ensign, especially since the yacht ensign must never be flown in international or foreign waters since it has no standing as a national ensign.

Yacht Club Burgee

The yacht Club burgee contains a unique design symbolic of the organization represented. If your boat is a mastless or single-masted yacht, fly your burgee from the bow staff. Boats without a bow staff should wear a burgee at the truck (top) of a single-masted yacht. On the other hand, if the truck is occupied with instruments or other conflicting gear, a pigstick can be affixed to a halyard so as to carry a flag above the truck. Alternatively, the burgee may be worn at a spreader halyard. If your boat has two or more masts, fly your burgee at the truck of the forward mast. Do not display more than one burgee at a time. The burgee your boat wears should be that of the group in whose activity you are participating, or whose harbor you are entering, if you are a member of that group. Otherwise, fly the burgee of your home organization. Each yacht Club usually has rules that detem1ine when their burgee should be flown.

Officer Flags

The officer flag is worn instead of the owner's private signal on all motor and sailing vessels except single-masted sailboats, where it is flown at the masthead in place of the Club burgee. Fly this flag either singly or under an associated ensign, that is, below the corresponding organizational ensign (not the national ensign or yacht ensign).

The only other officer flag that may be worn simultaneously with the owner's or captain's officer flag is that of a visiting officer of higher rank than the officer commanding the vessel. The visiting officer's flag may be flown from the bow staff (in place of the burgee) or from the port spreader halyard. The starboard-side halyard positions belong to the flag of the owner/captain, the port side halyard positions belong to the visitors' flags.

Size of Flags

Flags are often too small. The national ensign flown at a flag staff at the stem of your boat should be one inch on the fly for each foot of overall length. All other flags such as Club burgees, officer flags and private signals for use on sailboats should be approximately 1/2 inch on the fly for each foot above the waterline of the tallest mast on the boat.

Fly your flags properly and proudly!
