Part 1: "It's all Joel Ziev's fault," I tell myself getting ready to race the Commodore's Cup. I do not race, and here I am preparing *Rendezvous* to race, with me at the wheel.

I made the mistake of sitting next to Joel at the dinner dance and he told me the Commodore needed to race. I told Joel that I would do the Commodore's Cup, which seemed appropriate, but only if he crewed for me. Besides himself, Joel brought his crew, all experienced racers. Cap't Dave was also aboard to watch our 6-spot.

So, besides cleaning the boat for the raft-up, I had to prepare the boat to race – bottom clean, not too much water in the tanks (but enough for the raft-up), drop the dodger and stow the Bimini. Check. Worry about what to tell sloop sailors about sailing a Nonsuch catboat. Check. Clip the finger nails short so I cannot bite them, check. Get nervous. Big check.

Part II: So, that was pre-race – this is post. There were two things that really worried me before the race – the start with the milling boats and then finding the turning marks. And I guess flopping totally in the race.

The start was a bit anticlimactic and with Joel in the companionway calling the turns (my own tactician! – it is like have Gary Jobson aboard), we started OK, I believe third or fourth across of seven. Finding the marks - Joel had them all programmed into his GPS! That left boat speed.

We came in fourth, and overall, it was a very interesting experience. You have probably heard that racing successfully makes you a better sailor. Having helmed a boat around a race course, I agree. I need to be a much better sailor then I am, with a better understanding of the boat, wind, tacking angles, etc.

Will I do it again? I think so, but I clearly need to either program the turning marks into a GPS or just learn where they are – it is not something I can casually do during a race. And a tactician of my own - I really liked that, but suspect Joel will want to go back to his own boat to race.

So, the next time a racer tries to convince you to race your boat, take them up on it, but get them to crew to show you the ropes. It is not as scary as it seems and they inevitably want to convert a day sailor/cruiser into a racer, so they just might say yes. It is an experience you will not forget.




Sailed Course

From the Cruising Chairman

Harvest Moon, Red Moon, crisp evenings where we are reaching for fleece lined jackets and breezy sailing days with decisions as to reefing or otherwise shortening sail. These are all sure signs of the fall sailing season and the end of summer. It is also the time to look back and recall hopefully a bunch of good memories of times out on the water on our boats. For me, a special moment comes to mind.

It was a beautiful late August day and I had been spending time in and around Shelter Island and figuring out the currents and tides so as to make a passage through Plum Gut to start the return trip to the Western Long Island Sound. The decision was made to leave mid-morning so as to time the entry at about slack and then catch the flood tide into the Sound and across to Saybrook and up the Connecticut River to Essex. As we approached the gut coming along Long Beach and Orient Point in Gardiner's Bay, we had a nice breeze and were able to sail and motor-sail along the shore watching for other boat traffic and the ferries. We got closer to the point and the famous coffee pot lighthouse and saw a boat that had come through the gut and was sailing into the bay and another that was about to come through as well. We kept our course heading to the mid-channel buoy and then heard familiar voices hailing on the radio, only to find two North Shore Yacht Club boats as the ones that had come East and through the gut to enjoy the wonderful sailing and harbors of the East End and North Fork, Caress and Cool Fire. With all the possible boats to come in contact with in a passage through the famous Plum Gut, here were three NSYC boats out cruising. What were the odds?

It seems that this type of thing does happen fairly regularly as it has happened when coming into other harbors up and down the Sound, and even in places further out East toward Rhode Island, Block Island, Martha's Vineyard. Just this past weekend, the wind was blowing hard out of the NE and there were a number of boats out "enjoying" the fall sailing weather. I looked around and it was not surprising to see that other clubs boats were still in port, while NSYC members were the ones flying the club's red and white colors while out taking advantage of the chance to get in a few more weekends of sailing.

The summer seems to have given us a run of great weather and members the opportunity to get away on their vacations and cruises. As a group, we had a mix of events. Some of the target cruises that were planned had to be postponed or cancelled due to rainy weather, such as the trip to Norwalk in June, but it turns out that many members did get there to visit on their own and enjoy a very friendly club in a lovely harbor. Robert Coles...Pacific Odyssey Welcome Home!

Galapagos >>> Marquesas >>> Tuamotu's >>>> Tahiti

Robert joined Jimmy Cornell's Blue Planet Odyssey circumnavigation early in 2015...an around the world sailing rally aimed at raising awareness of the global effects of climate change and the most urgent issues facing our ocean. Participants take part in a number of oceanographic and meteorological projects by deploying autonomous scientific instruments, gathering and transmitting data from remote ocean areas from where there is an acute absence of up-to-date information on climatic conditions. Some boats are carrying eye examination equipment supplied by HIT and are giving eye tests to the local children with the results sent to the HIT organization in Germany who will supply the children with glasses free of charge.

With the Odyssey, Robert departed on March 9, 2015 from Puerto Ayora, a town in central *Galapagos*, Ecuador as coskipper of SV Hinckley 50, "Ransom" along with a widely dispersed fleet of 12 other participating boats. Crews kept in close touch by VHF, email, satellites and SSB.

First destination was April 4th at Fatu Hiva in the Marquesas, distance, 2,450 miles. Subsequent "Ports-of-Call" included:

April 7 -9... Hiva Oa April 9-10... Oa-Pu April 11-20... Nukku-Hiva

April 23-30... Visits series of islands in the Marquesas and Tuamotu's

May 3-6... Papeete-Tahiti May 8... Bora Bora

May 9... Back in the USA after 3728 miles

As Robert says, "The most challenging aspect of any expedition is, "the human factor" and has many supporting examples to share from his Pacific Odyssey.

This year our extended cruise was with our new friends, former NSYC members, David and Leslie Wollin who are members at PWYC and own SUMMERSAULT, a Catalina 42. They are members of the Corinthian Sailing Club and they invited us to join the Corinthian's Patriot Cruise, which started in Scituate and ended at Charlestown Marina with stops in various harbors in between.

We left NSYC on Thursday, July 23: Our cruise started with my clumsiness in taking a wrong step on the boat before leaving the mooring which left me with a fracture in my left foot, which although it hurt me the entire trip, did not prevent me from doing much. We motored to New Haven YC for the first night. The rest of the week we sailed toward Cape Cod with stops along the way.

We started week #2, Thursday morning we had a leisurely sail in Cape Cod Bay to Scituate Harbor where we moored at Scituate Boat Club. The following day was a layover day in Scituate. The Corinthian festivities commenced with registration, a captains' meeting and cocktails, followed by dinner at Barkers Tavern where a new friend told of his exciting life-saving rescue from a Crealock 37 off the coast of the Carolinas.

Saturday started with a Corinthian parade out of the harbor and a lazy sail to Spectacle Island in Boston Harbor. This is a National Park on a reclaimed island and the marina is managed by the Massachusetts Maritime Academy. As we headed out of the Harbor on Sunday, we passed the Queen Mary II, which was coming in. It was quite a sight to be so close to it.

Week #3 started on Thursday and we got to Constitution Wharf next to the Charlestown Navy Base where we docked. We walked into town and attended the Closing Dinner hosted by Leslie at the Constitution Museum. We started the trip home alone on Friday morning with beautiful stops along the way

Week #4 started with a great sail through Fisher Island Sound doing 8+ kn SOG until we entered Long Island Sound at which time the wind and current turned on our nose and we motored on a lake to Port Jefferson.

Our trip ended 4 days later - Day 25 - Sunday, August 16. Our final day we motored home and arrived at NSYC with a light boat, once we unloaded the dirty laundry.

This was a wonderful trip with great experiences. We made new friends and we went to places we had not previously heard of or had never considered. Chances are we may never have been to those places or met those people. That is what cruising is all about.



ATTENTION CRUISERS!

We have spoken for years about the desirability of having a way for us to inform each other of our cruising plans and whereabouts while we are on the water. I have started to look intoActiveCaptain.com as a vehicle to accomplish this.

Bear with me while I start to explain the steps to be taken:

- Log in to ActiveCaptain.com and set up an account with your email and password.
- 2. Download ActiveCaptain Companion on your phone or tablet from the Apple or Android app store. You can also do this on your computer but I assume that most people will not always have the computer on the boat or powered up. Then log in with your Active Captain account.
- 3. You cannot go any further unless you have an eCard for your boat. You get this from eboatcard.com. When setting up the eboatcard, you can insert as much or as little information about yourself and your boat as you wish.
- 4. When you get this accomplished, send me an email and I will circulate the information of who has joined from the Club to everyone who tells me they have joined. Then let's play with it and see if it has any value.
