Boat Share Program - December 2017

The NSYC Boat Share Program was an incredible success in its inaugural year. With the support of the Board and our membership we were able to fill the program to capacity, furnish a quality boat for the use of our skippers, and use the program as a tool to onboard new members to the club. The program ran at a financial surplus, and with heavy interest to continue the program next year. The Board has supported that recommendation.

Shortly after decommissioning Her C Gem, the club purchased Under Toad, another Colgate 26, for use by the Boat Share Program in 2018 and beyond. Marc Epstein has generously offered his time and talents to help bring this boat in line with the needs and expectations of the Boat Share Program, with the members of the program standing at the ready to provide assistance in work parties throughout the winter to complete these efforts.

In 2018, the Boat Share Program intents to make minor modifications to the policies/procedures of the program, based on what we've learned in our first year, while keeping the number of participants capped at twelve (as was the case in 2017). Once the season gets underway, and we reach 12 skippers, we will evaluate how many, if any, additional participants can be included in the program to ensure maximum utilization of the boat, without compromising the experience for the existing participants.



NSYC Junior Sailing Program

The NSYC launched its inaugural season of its newly minted Junior Sailing Program. The program was open to members and non-members in the 7-13 year old range with little or no sailing experience. The program was designed in two week sessions, full days from 9am-4pm, with on the water instruction as well as classroom instruction.

The club acquired 4 optimist dinghies which were in fairly good condition. Only minor repairs were required to make them in good working order for the season. We hired a very able instructor named James Broyles. James came to us with years of experience as a Level I sailing instructor and with certifications in first aide, CPR and US Safe Powerboating. James received high marks from the children, their parents, and the adult members that he taught as well.

The courses started on July 10th and ran through September 1st. In all, 12 children participated and each student completing the two week course was able to sail on their own by the end of their session. Some of the students went on to participate in the club races. Please check out the Kids Korner section of this Blinker for more details.

The children learned to rig and de-rig the Optis, and sail all different points of sail. Some of the guicker learners even began racing each other. Capsize drills were performed, but only once during all 4 sessions did a participant have to right their boat while sailing. After a hot morning sailing around the harbor, the children were happy to jump into the bay and cool off. On days without wind, James took them to the beach on the point, and rainy days they stayed inside and had instruction. After instruction and knot tying the children challenged each other in numerous games of "Go to the Head of the Class" and "Jinga" matches.

All in all, all participants had a wonderful time, and many are planning to return next summer to take advanced beginner or racing classes. Please spread the word, as we will be looking to expand the program next summer to additional participants.

Finance & Investments Leo Kamp – Portfolio is doing very well.






NSYC's 16th Annual Moonlight Regatta








2017 Lobster Clambake a Huge Success!


NSYC Dinner Dance and Sailing Awards

Cruising Corner

Target Cruise to Cold Spring Harbor and Snyder Cup Cruising race

July 27, 2017

Preparations were made, boats loaded up and the weather seemed promising, even if the winds were light and rain predicted for overnight. The scheduled event was a combined Target Cruise and the running of the Snyder Cup long distance race. After some delay, the participants in both got under way and left their moorings. The light wind was just enough to keep boats moving at the start, which was off Gangway Rock out in the Sound after leaving the protect confines of Manhasset Bay. Under the race rules, each participant in the race would record their start time while passing Gangway and call it in. Three boats started the race, Vision, Wynsum and Indecision, so there was an official race. Unfortunately, with the light winds, the cruising participants made little headway and barely succeeded in clearing Execution Light before announcing that they were retiring from the race. The wind did pick up somewhat, but was on the nose out of the ENE. However, Vision was able to make her way out to the finish off R32A to claim the trophy. Congratulations to Marc Epstein for a good sail and thanks for participating in the event.

The second part of the event was the Target Cruise to Cold Spring Harbor. I am happy to report that we had more participation in the cruise and thank all that came out, in spite of the forecasted rain and thunderstorms for the overnight stay on anchor in Cold Spring. The cruising participants reported that some sailed part of the way and motored the rest of the time and happily no sign of rain showed up until later that night. The harbor is a lovely spot just South of Oyster Bay and our anchorage was off of Cove Neck that separates Oyster Bay and Cold Spring. Beautiful homes and trees and good holding ground make for a near perfect spot, only getting better because the water temperature was also perfect for a later afternoon/early evening swim to cool off. KeyLI and Adventure Us were the first to arrive and picked out the great spot, soon to be joined by Wynsum, Indecision and Circe, and later by Taina. After some discussion, the plan was firmed up to have dinner on board each boat and then accept the gracious invitation from KeyLI to come over for a post dinner party. A great evening of sharing food, drink and lots of stories and laughs.

We have a well structured program, directed by the Race Management Committee, to challenge our sailing skill in competition with others. As a club, we recognize those who have sailed well.

The results of the seven competitions that NSYC holds are on the following two pages, and we have recognized our winners with trophies presented at the annual Dinner Dance. They comprise a variety of races representing our members interests: two long distance races open to other clubs, the YRA sanctioned Day Race and the Moonlight Regatta; five members only races, one short distance hard-core race, the Borden Cup, and then four cruising races, that are designed to take the stress out of competitive starts and rely on sailing ability rather than starting tactics. They are designed to provide our cruising members with the opportunity for sailing competition along with the joy of sailing..

Our approach seems to be working, as fully 31% of our fleet and 40% of our members participated in our races. These include the racers, of course, but also our Race Committee members for our own and the one-design races held in the bay (there were 12 RC days on the Worry Wart). So, you see, that the North Shore Yacht Club is doing very well maintaining 400 years of yachting tradition — and having a grand time doing it.

Fran tackled her illness with grace and fortitude. She welcomed and sought visitors, continued her considerable charitable work until she could no longer participate. In spite of her loss of arm and hand movement she mastered an "eye gaze" computer and managed to maintain contact with friends and family through eye movements on a key board to send texts and emails. She could also use it to speak through the computer's text to voice capacity and watched a movie with her friend the day before she passed.

Fran's very productive life included the raising of her two wonderful sons, a long and illustrious Wall Street career that culminated in her becoming First Vice President of Merrill Lynch before retirement in 2001. She was on several charitable boards, volunteered at her synagogue and was a contributor and organizer to many community social activities and events.

Fran loved the life on the water and sailed with Alan up and down the sound, Maine, Cape Cod and other places. Swimming off the boat, cocktail hour and exploring the local places were among her favorite boating activities. She loved sailing and all the great friends it brought her at the NSYC. She will be missed by many and her memory will endure with much love.

In Memoriam – Last Call Sad News at NSYC

Judge Alan L. Honorof



Longtime NSYC member, Judge Alan L. Honorof, passed away suddenly in early August. Judge Honorof was devoted to his two children, Lindsay and Marshall, who shared his love of sailing. His boat, Tradewind, a Jeanneau 37', graced the NSYC fleet.

Alan was born in Miami and grew up in West Hempstead. He graduated from George Washington University (from where daughter also graduated), then earned his JD at Temple University School of Law. From 1974 to 1979, he was a Nassau County Assistant District Attorney. He then went out on his own as a solo practitioner, where many of his clients were maritime businesses. He also served as Hempstead Village Attorney, Hempstead Village Associate Justice, Glen Cove City Attorney, and Plandome Manor Village Attorney.

In 1996, he was appointed by Governor George Pataki as a New York State Court of Claims judge, and spent his entire judicial career as an acting Supreme Court Justice in Mineola. He presided over criminal cases, including many high-profile ones. In 2011, he earned his Captain's license. He often helped a friend bring boats from New York to Florida in the fall, and then back again in the spring.

His love of the sea was lifelong, having grown up with a family powerboat. He owned a powerboat for many years and would take it to Ocean Beach, Fire Island, where he served as a prosecutor during the 1980s. When he and his then-wife Debbi moved to Plandome Manor to raise their children, they made new friends who owned sailboats, and Alan fell in love with sailing.

Alan loved when his children came out sailing with him. "Dad was a great sailor and an even better father," says his daughter, Lindsay. "He loved NSYC and was a proud member for many years (even when he didn't have a boat!)" One of his proudest moments was when Lindsay earned a Captain's license and became a launch driver for NSYC.

Marshall also remembers happy sailing adventures with his dad. "My dad took me out on a boat for the first time when I was about a week old, and for the last time just a few weeks before he died. My strongest recollections will always be of the two of us, out on the water somewhere. Aside from his children and his job, there's nothing in the world he loved as much as sailing."

DORMAN – Neil of Sands Point, NY passed away suddenly on November 4th in Tucson, AZ. A devoted husband to Monika, loving father to Keith and Randi and her husband Rob, and adoring grandfather to Skye.

Neil was intelligent, kind and ethical. He received his BA, Master's and PhD in Philosophy from the University of Wisconsin and an MBA from New York University. He was a 2nd Lt. in the Army. Neil worked in his family's cheese company, Dorman's Cheese, for 20 years until he orchestrated its sale in 1987. He taught Business Ethics at Columbia Business School and worked briefly on Wall Street. He loved good food, wine, books, poetry, classical music, rowing, and hiking in the Santa Catalina Mountains but his favorite hobby was sailing his 30 ft. S2 "Curds A'Whey" followed by his 36 ft. Catalina "Curds Away".

His boats were equipped with the latest technologies. He even installed solar panels on his "Curds Away" so that his wife could use her computer and he could make ice cubes on board. He was a Trustee at NSYC from 2004 through 2010 and Club Auditor from 2004 thru 2013. He was a pro active auditor, always trying to keep the expenditures of the club low and made sure that everybody paid their dues.

Past commodores appreciated Neil's advice, insight and assistance with financial issues. When it came to sailing, Neil was more of a cruiser/navigator than a racer but the one time he did race, he won the Borden's cup with his wife and son as crew.

He will be terribly missed.
